

School Updates

Punctuality - Arriving on time for school.

This week we have seen a lot of children arriving late into school. Whilst we appreciate that this is sometimes unavoidable, we would like to stress that this impacts greatly on your child if they are late.

When pupils **arrive late**, they miss out on essential instructions given at the beginning of the lesson. This can significantly reduce achievement, regardless of academic ability. **Children** may also feel awkward **arriving** to the classroom when everyone else is settled.

If a **child** is 10 minutes **late** getting to **school**, it is more like 20 minutes until they **are** actually learning. The **impact** on the **class** as a whole is even larger.

Being frequently late for school adds up to lost learning:

- Arriving 5 minutes late every day adds up to over 3 days lost each year.
- Arriving 15 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 2 weeks a year.
- Arriving 30 minutes late every day is the same as being absent for 19 days a year.

If your child attends school they are more likely to succeed

BUT REMEMBER – "IT IS ALWAYS BETTER TO BE LATE THAN NOT TO ARRIVE AT ALL"

Science Week 2021 Competition Winners



Reason: To help in recycling and decrease the carbon dioxide levels in the Description: The body has a square bostom (with curved sides) but has the top like a white, big egg. There is a covered hole in the middle, which leads to a chopper, next to a button saying 'CHOP'. The hole goes to a popping way On the troat of the bot, there is a keyboard with a pixture of a blue microphone and on the top of these appliances, there is a small, rectangular, huosinseed box. And last but not least, there is the name of the bot (Eco - Bot) printed above the recumpular box. Beside the box, there is a green charge sign of four boxes. If there is only one box and the colour is red, it needs more charge. It also has a wire to plug it in if it has to charge. Method: Write what you want it to be made into, like a bracelet. If the keyboard is not your language or your hands are preoccupied, just press the microphone and same your object. The object's name will appear on the rectangular box. When you are sure about your object is correct and palace a recyclable material in the hole - for example a plastic borde - and press the 'CHOP' button. Wast a few minutes and your product will be revealed on the popping way. If the charge is low, plug it in a socket and in thirty minutes, it will be fully charged.

Safety Tips

Snapchat Parent / Carer Advice





What is Snapchat?

Snapchat is one of the image-based social media platforms which is incredibly popular with children. One of the key features of Snapchat is that, by default, messages sent through Snapchat disappear seconds after they are viewed by the recipient. The minimum age to use Snapchat is 13 but it is a popular and widely used platform among children younger than this.

Safety Tips



As with all Internet activity, talk to your child about how they use Snapchat, the importance of not 'oversharing, and any issues they have faced.



The default privacy setting of 'My Friends' prevents children from sharing 'snaps' with users unknown to them. However, children may change this setting and make their posts public. Ensure your child is aware of the importance of maintaining strong privacy settings and check the settings your child has selected.



In the settings options, ensure your child has Snapmap set to 'ghost mode'. This will ensure that nobody can see their current location.



Ask your child if they know how to report or block a user who sends them anything that upsets them. This can be done by going to the friends list, selecting the person creating the issue and then selecting the gear icon.



Remind your child that although Snapchat automatically deletes images once seen. somebody can copy the image and share it with

Reasons for concern



As messages disappear shortly after being read, Snapchat has become a popular tool for abuse such as online bullying as abusers feel they will not be held to account for messages posted once they are deleted. This is supported by the fact that if somebody takes a screenshot of a message posted on Snapchat then the person who posted it is informed that this has happened, making it more uncomfortable for people to take evidence of abuse they have suffered or witnessed.







Children are naturally more prone to addictive behaviour than adults. As such, the inclusion of features such as 'Snap Streaks' (where two users share pictures with each other on consecutive days) encourages addictive



behaviour, Snapchat rewards longer streaks with special emojis. This can result in children increasing their daily usage of the app




