Drop off at Breakfast Club



What to do if you're worried about a child

If you're worried about a child, even if you're unsure, you can speak to us about your concerns. Whether you want to report child abuse and neglect or aren't sure what to do, we're here to listen, offer advice and support and can take the next steps if a child's in danger.

Due to an increase in demand across our service, our voice helpline is currently operating between the hours of **10am** and **4pm Monday to Friday** and **10am and 2pm at the weekends**. You can contact us outside of these hours by email at help@nspcc.org.uk. It's free and you don't have to say who you are. If you think that a child is at immediate risk of harm, please call the Police on 999.

Don't go through life, grow through life.






Year 2 read the story 'Tadpole's Promise' and then talked about the life cycle of a frog and metamorphosis.

Year 1 enjoyed learning about growth at the North school farm. We saw lambs that were not even 24 hours old!



Star of the Week - Nursery






Star of the week this week in Nursery is Piper. Piper has developed amazing toilet independence this week. Well Done Piper.



Star of the Week - Reception













Star of the week in Craig Smith class is Tia. She is trying so hard with her writing and is using time connectives and describing words. Well done

Our Star of the Week is Keiya for Working so hard during our Science Week!












The Star of the Week in Bright Class this week is Ethan M for his positive approach to his learning! Keep it up Ethan, you have made us so proud this week!






British Science Week
